Small Cell Wireless Pole Attachment and Deployment Issues: Federal and State Legal and Regulatory Developments Impacting Public Power Utilities

Over the next five years, the wireless broadband industry is projecting a geometric increase in the deployment and installation of new small cell wireless facilities and associated fiber on utility poles, streetlights, ducts, conduits, and "street furniture" in an effort to support robust broadband requirements for 5G implementation and other technologies. The wireless broadband industry, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), Congress, and state legislatures are increasingly pushing for ways to streamline and lower the cost of access to publicly-owned infrastructure, including public power utility poles.

Learn the facts and myths about 5G and discuss other small cell wireless deployment issues. Explore the latest actions the FCC, Congress, and the states have taken to facilitate broadband deployment, and how these developments may affect public power utilities. This workshop includes a dive into the final recommendations from the FCC's Broadband Deployment Advisory Committee on model federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

Blockchain Technology: What Is It and What Should Your Utility Know?

Blockchain—the technology behind Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies—is increasingly seen as a disruptive technology. Utilities and third-party vendors are examining how to use the distributed ledger technology for “back-room” settlement operations, peer-to-peer or utility-to-customer transactions, and wholesale power trading. Vendors are approaching distribution systems with potential blockchain applications and other systems are seeing dramatic load increases due to cryptocurrency mining.

What's All this Talk About Resilience?

The gamut of natural disasters in 2017 and the continued closing or retirement of coal and nuclear plants helped to make resilience of the electric grid a priority discussion at FERC, DOE, NERC, the RTOs, and in the states. From the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking filed by the DOE in FERC Docket No. RM18-1 to FERC's ensuing consideration of issues in RTO markets in Docket No. AD18-7, and potential emergency action under the Federal Power Act and the Defense Production Act of 1950 — fuel security is in focus at the federal level. Get a handle on the statutory authority under which DOE and FERC are being asked to act and the roles that RTOs, NERC, and the states will play in the reliability oversight discussion.

Managing Risk in the Supply Chain

Cyber threats can come from many sources, including and often through the supply chain. FERC and NERC are taking steps to address those risks at the national level, and helping utilities manage their own risk. High Tide for Water Rights Litigation

Recent Clean Water Act and water rights litigation poses potentially tremendous risks for public power – from possible liability for groundwater seepage to uncertain access to water supplies. Recent cases have asserted that coal ash impoundments or landfills are “point sources” and that discharges of pollutants through groundwater to waters of the United States violate the CWA. In others, judicial challenges to ownership of the water are increasing risks associated with water resource planning and acquisition, and even clouding title to existing supplies. Review the key issues of recent litigation and what strategies could minimize the risk of liability or an interrupted water supply.

The rapid development of variable renewable energy resources due to technological improvements, more competitive pricing and customer demand for "green power," has created a growing demand for energy storage to accommodate the variable output of these new resources. Each of these storage technologies has its own unique characteristics and challenges, which must be addressed in the contracts involving the development, operation, interconnection, or sale of the output from these storage technologies. Review key drafting points and legal and commercial considerations involved in these agreements, and sample language that can address the unique characteristics and challenges of many of these technologies, with emphasis on battery energy storage systems.

Are Drones a Threat to Utility Critical Infrastructure?

The use of Unmanned Aircraft System, or drone, technology is increasing exponentially. As of February 2018, more than 1 million drones have been registered with the FAA. Commercial drones are increasing worker safety, efficiency, and cost savings in major industries including the utility industry. However, the easy access to drones, coupled with the current regulatory environment, raises security and safety questions for critical or sensitive facilities. Discuss recent hostile uses of drones, the increasingly new defensive technology that is available to counter aggressive drones, and dive into the laws governing the use of such technology and the legal measures that utilities should be taking now to protect critical infrastructure.

Transmission Competition Under FERC Order No. 1000 at a Crossroads: Reinforce or Repeal?

Seven years ago, FERC issued Order No. 1000, which included provisions intended to promote competition in transmission development. Results have been mixed to date with full implementation still a work in progress. Has competition produced too little benefit for too much regulatory burden? Should Order 1000 be dramatically revised or scrapped altogether? Alternatively, do results to date show that increased competition delivers customer savings and better projects, meaning the real problem is too few bidding opportunities and unnecessarily cumbersome procedures? These are critical questions in an era of rising wholesale transmission rates with few opportunities for public power utilities to offset the cost with transmission investment. This panel will explore what we know to date about where competition has worked and not worked, with panelists giving their varied perspectives on revisiting and reforming vs. discarding the competitive provisions of order No. 1000.

Uncharted Waters: Navigating Ethics Rules in Multijurisdictional Practice

Recognizing the changing landscape of the legal profession, the ABA amended Model Rule 5.5 in 2002 to remove the barriers to temporary practice across state lines. Since then, nearly every jurisdiction in the United States has adopted some form of the multijurisdictional practice rule. However, ethics codes and decisional law vary from state to state, making room for missteps. Explore the risk areas for lawyers engaged in multijurisdictional practice, including unauthorized practice, restrictions on statements to the media, conflicts of interest, limits on pre-litigation investigation, and regulation of law firm marketing. Also discuss procedural issues, including state bar jurisdiction, choice of law, and reciprocal discipline.
