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INTRODUCTION

his guide outlines the resources, support, and processes used to respond to emergencies at the federal and state, local, tribal and territorial (SLTT) levels. Emergency management departments at all levels of government use standardized emergency response structures, activate Emergency Operation Centers (EOCs), and organize responses according to Emergency Support Functions (ESFs). The descriptions of response structures, EOCs, and ESF 12-Energy give insight into how public power utilities can access assistance before, during, and after energy emergencies.

PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE ROLES

Federal Government

Multiple agencies within the federal government are involved in emergency preparedness and response. These agencies play a variety of roles prior to, during, and following energy emergency events to support situational awareness and information sharing, and to assist energy system operators and SLTT officials in emergency preparedness and response activities.

- Prior to emergency events, federal agencies publish energy data and market information, analyze and share information on threats to the energy sector, conduct research and development on new technologies, set standards and regulations related to energy sector safety and security, assist SLTT partners with hazard assessment and mitigation, support SLTT planning and preparedness activities, fund energy resilience projects, and convene energy emergency exercises.
- During and following emergency events, federal agencies aid industry and SLTT governments, convene stakeholders for information sharing and situational awareness, distribute energy resources (e.g., generators, fuel) as needed, and grant relief from energy-related federal regulations to facilitate response and recovery.

State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial Governments

SLTT governments play a critical role in energy planning and emergency response. Emergency planning and preparation among SLTT government agencies ensures coordination processes are established and that community-owned utilities have access to the resources and support necessary for restoration following an energy emergency. Coordination and planning prior to an event can help SLTT government agencies and community-owned utilities mitigate or minimize the impact of a disruption and allow for an effective unified response during an energy emergency.

Community-owned utilities can coordinate with local governments and emergency managers prior to energy emergencies. Types of preparedness efforts that community-owned utilities can participate in include:

- Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs): Many communities have chosen to conduct all-hazards LEPC meetings to build relationships and coordinate preparedness efforts between response agencies and local stakeholders.
- Exercises: Participating in exercises can enhance working relationships with SLTT contacts in a low-stress environment. Exercises help identify potential gaps, available resources, and areas for further coordination.
- Training: Basic emergency management training can assist in understanding the organizational structures and language used for emergency management mitigation, response, and recovery efforts.

Utilities should contact their local emergency management department to identify which preparedness initiatives are available within their community.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE COORDINATION

Emergency management and response personnel coordinate using principles from the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS). A key component of NIMS is common terminology, which ensures effective communication. ICS, an element of NIMS, outlines a hierarchy for organized response actions. Emergency management personnel at all levels of government provide coordination assistance through the activation of emergency operations plans (EOPs) and emergency operations centers (EOCs).

Disaster response usually follows a similar order and timeline:

The local government responds to the emergency with the personnel, resources, and funds available. An EOP and an EOC may be activated to help coordinate actions and information sharing. If local officials recognize that disaster response and recovery actions require more

- resources or personnel than they have available locally, then they turn to the state or territorial government to request assistance.
- 2. The state or territorial government supports the local government with resources and personnel as needed. Requests are often coordinated through an EOC. Depending on the magnitude of the disaster, multiple local governments might simultaneously request assistance. If the need for federal assistance is identified, then a request for a Presidential Disaster Declaration may be submitted to the federal government through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).
- 3. If the Disaster Declaration is approved, then the National Response Framework is activated to coordinate federal programs and support. FEMA organizes resources and personnel through Regional Response Coordination Centers (RRCCs) and the National Response Coordination Center (NRCC).

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTERS

An Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is a physical or virtual location established to coordinate information and resources to support on-scene incident management activities. Typically, a large disaster would result in multiple EOCs being activated by SLTTs.

FEMA maintains a Regional Response Coordination Center (RRCC) in each region and the National Response Coordination Center (NRCC) to help coordinate federal emergency aid to SLTT governments. The staffing and organization of each coordination center may vary widely depending on the jurisdiction, the emergency response, and what resources and support are needed.


EMERGENCY SUPPORT FUNCTION 12-ENERGY

As defined in the National Response Framework, Emergency Support Functions (ESFs) delineate the primary response coordinating structure at the federal level. Each ESF designates a certain department or agency as the coordinator for the related activities, along with several primary and support agencies. ESF 12 is focused on energy.

The Department of Energy (DOE) is the lead agency for ESF 12 - Energy. The Office of Cybersecurity, Energy Security, and Emergency Response (CESER) manages DOE's ESF 12 responsibilities. During events requiring a federal response, CESER activates its Energy Response Organization to manage response activities,

including deploying responders, sharing situational awareness products, and coordinating with and providing technical assistance to federal, SLTT, and industry partners.

Figure 1 depicts the states and territories in the 10 FEMA regions. DOE has identified regional coordinators for each region to serve as the lead liaisons for ESF 12 response activities. During an energy emergency, ESF 12 Regional Coordinators coordinate with FEMA, other federal partners, SLTTs, and industry personnel in the affected area, and are the primary contact for energy issues.



USING THIS GUIDE

Understanding the basic role of Emergency Operations Centers, Emergency Operations Plans, the Federal Response Plan, the National Incident Management System, and the Incident Command System can enhance coordination activities between community owned utilities and SLTT and Federal agencies during restoration activities.

The remainder of this guide provides information on the resources, training, and personnel available to support preparedness actions and restoration activities for energy emergencies.

TRAINING, FUNDING, AND OTHER SUPPORTS

There are many different sources of funding and training programs available to community-owned utilities related to emergency response and resilience. Some programs may be available prior to an energy emergency to enhance preparedness. Other programs are only available following a presidentially declared disaster. Other programs may be available governments and federal agencies. This is not a comprehensive list. For additional resources available to community-owned utilities, consult the **Federal Funding Opportunities Guidebook.**

	TRAINING
NIMS	This course provides an overview of the National Incident Management System (NIMS). The National Incident Management System defines the comprehensive approach guiding the whole community - all levels of government, nongovernmental organizations (NGO), and the private sector - to work together seamlessly to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the effects of incidents. The course provides learners with a basic understanding of NIMS concepts, principles, and components.
ICS 100	ICS 100, Introduction to the Incident Command System, introduces the Incident Command System (ICS) and provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. This course describes the history, features and principles, and organizational structure of the Incident Command System. It also explains the relationship between ICS and the National Incident Management System (NIMS).
ICS 200	ICS 200, Basic Incident Command System for Initial Response, reviews the Incident Command System (ICS), provides the context for ICS within initial response, and supports higher level ICS training. This course provides training on, and resources for, personnel who are likely to assume a supervisory position within ICS.
EOC	The Basic Emergency Operations Center Functions course is designed to introduce the role, design, and function of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and the supportive relationship as a NIMS Command and Coordination component of the Multiagency Coordination System.

DESCRIPTION

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES Consult with relevant SLTT and federal agencies for eligibility requirements.

Pre-Disaster Mitigation

This FEMA grant program makes federal funds available to SLTT governments to plan for and implement sustainable cost-effective measures designed to reduce the risk to individuals and property from future natural hazards, while also reducing the need to rely on federal funding for future disasters. Community-owned utilities should contact SLTT Mitigation Program administrators for additional information and eligibility.

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

In this program, FEMA provides grants to SLTT governments to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures after a major disaster declaration. The purpose of the program is to reduce the loss of life and property due to natural disasters and to enable mitigation measures to be implemented during the immediate recovery from a disaster declaration. This funding is only available following a Presidential disaster declaration. Funds may be used for projects that will reduce or eliminate the losses from future disasters. Projects must provide a long-term solution to a problem. Community-owned utilities should contact SLTT Mitigation Program administrators for additional information and eligibility.

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities

This FEMA program focuses on research-supported, proactive investment in community resilience. Successful BRIC projects demonstrate innovative approaches to partnerships, such as shared funding mechanisms, and/or project design. Through BRIC, FEMA continues to invest in a variety of mitigation activities with an added focus on infrastructure projects and Community Lifelines. The BRIC program could be used to increase energy resiliency. Community owned utilities should contact SLTT Mitigation Program administrators for additional information and eligibility.

Public Assistance Grant Program

Federal grant assistance for debris removal, emergency protective measures, and the repair, replacement or restoration of disaster-damaged, publicly owned facilities when authorized by the President of the United States. Such authorization is provided, based on the state's request through FEMA, when the magnitude of an incident or threatened incident exceeds the affected SLTT government capabilities to respond and recover. Community-owned utilities should consult with SLTT emergency management agencies for additional information and eligibility.

Powering Sustainable Rural Communities	Under the authority of the Rural Electrification Act of 1936, USDA's Electric Program makes direct loans and loan guarantees, as well as grants and other energy project financing to electric utilities (wholesale and retail providers of electricity) that serve customers in rural areas. The program provides technical support and access to both damage assessments and restoration efforts for electric power generation, transmission, and distribution.
The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act	The bipartisan infrastructure law will stand up 60 new DOE programs, including 16 demonstration and 32 deployment programs, and expands funding for 12 research, development, demonstration, and deployment programs, through 2026. DOE will partner with states, communities, and industry in this effort to strengthen the nation's outdated energy infrastructure and move the U.S. economy towards a clean energy, lower carbon emissions future. Community-owned utilities should contact SLTT and DOE Energy representatives for additional information and eligibility.
Community Development Block Grant Mitigation Program	Housing and Urban Development's program is a unique and significant opportunity for eligible grantees to assist areas impacted by recent disasters to carry out strategic and high-impact activities to mitigate disaster risks and reduce future losses.
Cyber Security for Energy Delivery Systems Program	The objective of this DOE program is to enhance the reliability and resilience of energy infrastructure. This opportunity is expected to spur the development of next-generation tools and technologies that would reduce the risk of a cyber incident disrupting the energy system, including electricity generation, transmission, and distribution.
State Homeland Security Grant Program	This FEMA program supports the implementation of strategies to protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism and other catastrophic events. Grantees are expected to consider the most recent National Preparedness Report, which includes cybersecurity, recovery-focused core capabilities, and enhancing the resilience of infrastructure systems.
Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance Program	The Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration provides strategic investments to support economic development and attract private investment through infrastructure.

Transmission Infrastructure Program	The Western Area Power Administration provides this financing program aimed at expanding and modernizing the electric grid. The program's primary goal is to leverage federal funds to support the development of critical transmission and related infrastructure.	
Emergency Watershed Protection Program	This program allows communities to quickly protect infrastructure and land from additional flooding and soil erosion. EWP does not require a disaster declaration by federal or state government officials for program assistance to begin. The Natural Resources Conservation Service State Conservationist can declare a local watershed emergency and initiate program assistance in cooperation with an eligible sponsor. However, NRCS will not provide funding for activities undertaken prior to the signing of a cooperative agreement between NRCS and the sponsor.	
	ADDITIONAL RESOURCES AND SUPPORT	
Emergency Power Team	The US Army Corps of Engineers coordinates Emergency Power Team missions with power system stabilization and restoration activities to establish priorities for emergency generator installation. The Corps assists in restoring the energy infrastructure when requested and upon approval by the Secretary of Defense.	
Energy Waiver Library	CESER's Energy Waivers Library provides additional detail on regulatory relief granted by federal agencies during energy disruptions. The library also lists contact information for each agency and provides examples of past uses of each waiver.	
CESER Roles and Authorities	This page outlines the various executive branch and DOE authorities that establish CESER's role in securing the nation's energy infrastructure, maintaining situational awareness, discovering and mitigating cyber threats, and orchestrating response and recovery operations.	
Power Outage Incident Annex	Detailed descriptions of federal agency roles during a long-term power outage.	
National Incident Management System	A consistent nationwide template that guides all levels of government, non-governmental organizations, and the private sector through the command and coordination of incidents, resource management, and information management. This framework is applicable to emergency responders and other emergency management personnel, NGOs, the private sector, and elected and appointed officials responsible for making decisions regarding incidents.

Energy Emergency Assurance Coordinators	This program enables bi-directional communication and information sharing prior to and during energy disruptions and emergencies. The EEAC program is a cooperative effort between DOE CESER, and NASEO, NARUC, NGA and NEMA, to help the federal government and states work together to provide a unified response to energy emergencies.
Public Power Mutual Aid Network	Get or give help to/from this network of more than 2,000 participating utilities and coordinate with the authorities during widespread power outages. Outside of coordinating response, the network can also help utilities in putting disaster response plans in place and learning how to coordinate with local, state, and federal government and navigate immediate and long-term assistance to recover and rebuild.

FEDERAL AGENCY SUPPORT FUNCTIONS AND INTERESTS

Under the **National Response Framework** federal agencies are assigned Emergency Support Functions (ESFs) and support annexes that describe responsibilities among the private sector, non-government organizations, and federal partners.

The following table summarizes the typical functions and common requests for federal resources available to industries during a presidentially declared disaster response. Note that the table includes examples of shared information interests – the DOE ESF 12 Regional Coordinators handle requests on an event-specific basis.
